Why we use pronouns in our email signatures at KW Hab:

Pronouns are the shorter words we use when we talk to or about someone instead of using their full name each time. Having your pronouns in your email is a great way to let others know which pronouns to use when talking to you. By doing this we are showing respect to people's unique identities.

The pronouns we use are often connected to our gender. Gender means whether - or how much - we feel we are a man, a woman, a non-binary person, or another gender. Some people are both a man and a woman and some people have no gender.

Here are some examples:



This is Wendy (she/her). She owns a fast food chain of restaurants. Her team never cuts corners. Like Wendy, people who identify as female might use the pronouns she and her.



This is Euphemia (she/they). Euphemia runs a bank. She is retiring this year. Their dream is to travel the world. In this example, she and they/their are Euphemia's pronouns.



This is Clarke (he/him). He likes bird watching and the outdoors. Like Clarke, people who identify as male might use the pronouns he and him.





This is Kasey (they/them). They are athletic and they like to go hiking with their dog. Like Kasey, other people might use the pronouns they and them/their.



This is Ozzy (ze/hir). Ze is a talented wood worker. Hir work has won awards in hirs community. Like Ozzy, some people alternate pronouns, while some use none at all. This includes some non-binary people, those who identify with multiple genders or who don't identify with a specific gender at all.



This is Fara (Xe/xem). Xe loves to go fishing. **Xem** fishing skills has made **xem** the best fisher in the local area. Like Fara, some people prefer gender neutral pronouns.

Examples of Different Pronouns

*Disclaimer: These are just references to commonly used pronouns, there are many other pronouns and neopronouns that exist. Pronouns may also be used interchangeably based on a person's identity. Some people prefer to use their name without pronouns.
